Missing Gonzales girl found safe in Tarrant Co.

Amber Alert had been issued for 12-year-old Allyanna Hernandez

A missing 12-year-old Gonzales girl who was the subject of an Amber Alert has been found safely Monday, April 3, in Tarrant County — more than 48 hours after she first ran away from home.

Allyanna Marie Hernandez was located at a residence by the Tarrant County Sheriff's Office and will now be returned to her mother.

Meanwhile, 19-year-old Guillermo Flores of Mansfield has been taken into custody for questioning in regards to the incident, which began when Allyanna went missing sometime after midnight Saturday, April 1. He has been charged with harboring a runaway and other charges could be pending as this is still an active investigation.

"Gonzales Police Department would like to thank the Texas Department of Public Safety Amber Alert Fusion Center, Texas Rang-

ers, FBI, Gonzales County Sheriff's Office, Tarrant County Sheriff's Office, The National Missing and **Exploited Children and Dallas** Police Department for their assistance," Gonzales Police Lt. Jason Montoya said. "We would also like to thank everyone who called in with information regarding this child."

Pursuit, manhunt nets armed suspect

Guadalupe and Gonzales County sheriff's deputies arrested a Cedar Creek man Monday, April 3 after a pursuit through three counties that ended in an hour-long manhunt

near Private Road 2002.

Gonzales County Sheriff's Office deputies were notified at 4:45 p.m. Monday that Guadalupe County in hot pursuit of a suspect on US 183 entering Gonzales County after turning off Interstate 10 in Caldwell County. The suspect, later identified as 47-year-old Steven Turley, was allegedly armed and had intentionally rammed into a Guadalupe County



Cost corn grower named Texas winner of National Corn Yield Contest

America's corn farmers proved, once again, they are resilient, innovative, and competitive. By adapting practices, adopting new technology, and doing-morewith-less, America's corn farmers made great contributions in helping to feed and fuel a growing world.

It is this innovative spirit that the National Corn Growers Association tips its hat to every year as we honor farmers from across the country for their efforts and exceptional results in the National Corn Yield Contest. Through their efforts, NCGA members contributed valuable data that will help all growers as they continue to drive efficient and sustainable agricultural production.

Brian Fink of Cost, TX, placed First in the state

in the C: No-Till Non-Irrigated Class with a yield of 89.5284 bushels per acre. The hybrid used in the winning field was Pioneer P1759YHR. The winning field was located

in Texas. Brian Fink was one of 538 state winners nationwide. The 2022 contest participation included 6,337 entries from 46 states. Of the state winners, 27 growers - three from each of nine classes - were named national winners, representing 12 states.

The average yield among national winners was more than 340.7245 bushels per acre - more than double the proiected 2022 U.S. average of 172 bushels per acre. While there is no overall contest winner, yields from first, second and third place farmers' overall production categories topped 262.7586 bushels per acre.

"Year after year, farmer participants contribute to building a better crop for tomorrow. By exploring adaption, innovation, and the tools new technologies offer, farmers sharpen their game and set new standards for the industry," said Tom Hagg, a Minnesota Farmer and current President of the National Corn Growers Association. "One thing I know about corn farmers is how much they love to push themselves to be their best. The 2022 NCYC winners' class is no exception, this group grew corn like champi-

ons." Farmers are encouraged through the contest to utilize new, efficient production techniques. Agronomic data gleaned from the contest revealed the following:

 Average harvest population for the national winners was 37,164 seeds per acre, compared to 34,386 for all entrants.

data gleaned from the contest revealed the following:

 National winners applied an average of 203 pounds of nitrogen, 50 pounds of phosphorus and 50 pounds of potassium per acre.

 Average commercial nitrogen use per bushel of yield was 0.85 pounds for the national winners and 0.82 pounds for all entrants.

Data gleaned from the

contest revealed the following:

• 44 percent of the national winners applied trace minerals, compared to 49 percent of all entrants.

data gleaned from the contest revealed the following:

• 22 percent of national winners applied manure, compared to 24 percent of all entrants.

For more than half a century, NCGA's National Corn Yield Contest has provided corn growers with the opportunity to compete with their colleagues to grow the most corn per acre, helping feed and fuel the world. This has given participants not only the recognition they deserved but the opportunity to learn from their peers.

Best way to check spinach leaves is with a taste test

O. How can we tell if our spinach is still good to harvest and eat? It looks in good shape now after we weeded it.

A. The easiest thing to do is to taste the spinach leaves. I would suspect if the foliage looks appetizing that it will taste good for salads and recipes. Spinach usually has a long productive period in the garden.

Q. We were at my neighbors house for coffee last weekend and were amazed how that her poinsettia looked as good as it did before Christmas when we gave it to her as a present. She said that all she does is keep it watered twice per week by soaking; has it in front of a picture window with an eastern exposure; and makes sure it is not in front of a hot air vent. Is that possible? It has been over 4 months already.

A. Yes, that is about half as long as the poinsettia will stay attractive in the house if you follow the care techniques that you described for your

Q. What are the sparrow looking birds with the red colored chest and neck that are visiting my bird feeders? They seem to especially like the safflower seed.

A. In the San Antonio area that would be house finches. In some parts of our region you might also see purple finches but they are less common.

Q. Our favorite nursery has good looking semperfloren begonias on sale. We have never planted them before but they look good and we are thinking of giving it a try. How much sun can they handle and how long will they survive in the South Texas summer?

A. Semperfloren begonias are an excellent choice for planting in shade in our region. When planted now they also can tolerate a planting area that has morning sun.

Begonias will last through the summer and even into the winter in the shade.



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



GONZALES CO. HISTORY

- 1825 April, first settlement Kerr Creek area. It was the only Anglo colony west of the Colorado River
- 1836 April 21, victory at San Jacinto means Texas is now a free republic
- 1887 April 2, J.B. Wells & Company purchased fifteen full-blood and three quarter-grade Hereford bulls and had them sent to his ranch where he will use them for breeding with his Devon stock. The opinion stated is that the Hereford is wellsuited to this area. The Devon is well-suited to the area but is some what smaller than desired. The Hereford is expected to add size to the improved stock.
- 1899 April 27, the IOOF celebrated its 80th anniversary with a parade and a basket picnic. To add to the meal, eight carcasses of mutton, four hogs, and some beef were barbecued.
- 1912 April 5, City Council meeting results: the new light system install by Citizens Electric Light and Power Company was accepted. A few more suspension lights strung over the center of the streets will be installed. There were complaints voiced that some building owners let their gutters end at the top of the building instead of running the water all the way to the ground. Water falling 12 to 14 feet from the tops of the buildings was causing damage to streets and sidewalks.
 - April 12, parents are admonished for allowing their daughters to wear laces, muslins, gauze hose and slippers to school. The girls should wear heavy woolen clothing for comfort and health.
 - April 15, a telephone small enough to fit in a vest pocket has been invented in England. It can be attached to connections found in
 - April 17, R.A. Remschel let a contract for a new building to be erected on the southwest corner of St. Andrew and St. Paul Streets. It will be 60 feet deep and 110 feet across. Meisenhelder is the contractor.
 - -April 23, the foundation is almost completed on the Dilworth Bank building and the brick masons are set to begin their work. (Corner St. George and St. Joseph- now LaBella Restaurant)
 - April 23, Mrs. H. Reese, Jr. is offering eggs for hatching. They are from a heavy-laying, prize-winning strain.
 - April 26, the Inquirer reports that winter has bid us a fare well and that ladies may now "safely don their thinnest lingerie frocks and carry that ever pretty adjunct to the summer toilet, the fan, without fear of being caught in a norther before returning home.
 - April 26, citizens are urged to attend a meeting with men from San Antonio who are planning a road from San Antonio to Port O'Connor. Gonzales citizens are urged to make every effort to get this road routed through Gonzales.
- 1928 April 26, announcement that the first dance of the season will be held at the Breezy Roof Garden the night of May 3. Glen Wallace and his orchestra of San Antonio will provide the music for this occasion. The Breezy Roof Garden was located in the 800 block of St. Paul Street near the railroad. Acing the smell test... uring growing-up years, I

don't remember hearing much talk about splashing on sweet-smelling stuff. Surely it was poetic injustice, what with cotton-picking heating up many

of my kin who labored in fields, not to mention other farm chores that caused streams of sweat that seemed inevitable during half of each calendar year. The injustice? Air-conditioning was

a term we hadn't heard of; the closest thing to it in our town during the 1940s was movie theaters claiming to offer "air-cooled comfort." Many of us were either born too soon, or airconditioning arrived too late....

With such in mind, a recent piece by SMU grad Lucy Ladis in the Dallas Morning News was more than "eye-catching." It grabbed our olfactory nerves as well. It detailed a new Dallas boutique that offers customers signature perfumes.

I'm not sure I recall that smelling good ever warranted great cash outlays.

Signature perfume at the Krigler boutique of the Ritz Carlton Hotel is offering a "\$60,000 experience... where shoppers can create their custom perfume from raw materials." Thoughts of paying such a princely price pretty much shuts down my whole smelling system, and causes my sweating to go into overdrive....

This perfumery that turns out "signature scents" purports to provide a subtle "hint at luxury." It is light years removed from years of childhood, when elementary school girls bragged about Blue Waltz perfume. Unquestionably, though, the unmistakable smell seemed unrelated to luxury, sailing well over the "hint" bar....

Coming to mind is a third-grade boy, slouched at his desk on a hot day in mid-May. Known for her subtle classroom remarks, the teacher observed, "Young man, one of our deodorants is wearing thin."

His answer: "Well, it must be yours, ma'am, 'cause I ain't wearing none."....

Now, back to the signature scents. Owner Ben Krigler explains that creating such exotic fragrances doesn't happen overnight, and that it can take up to 18 months to let them age.

That's the way the Kriglers have made perfumes for more than a century, having turned out some of the world's "most coveted fragrances," he told The Dallas Morning News.

In fact, it all started in 1879, when founder Albert Krigler pursued the hand of a French perfumer's daughter. For their engagement, he produced the scent that resulted in "oohs and ahhhs" from the discerning set. It was called "Pleasure Gardenia 79."

Krigler has thought the matter through. He points out that the perfume industry is booming in Dallas as the result of a post-pandemic upswing in personal grooming, plus growing demand for luxury.

Further, he thinks Dallas to be a great market for testing custom perfume demand. The city is the company's thirdlargest online market and number six in the U.S. fragrance market.

The company has been courting elite clientele since 1904, and the customer list includes Jackie Kennedy, F. Scott Fitzgerald and Audrey Hepburn. Fragrances start at \$455 for 50 milliliters, and Krigler offers candles and soaps in signature scents.....

There are others, of course, who figure Texans start out running in the back of the pack, where odors sometimes are more prevalent than aromas.

The same critics think most folks have oil wells and can buy whatever they want. Truth to tell, however, the fragrance market is big around the world, growing to nearly \$11.5 billion in 2022. For a five-year period ending then, the industry gained an average 8.4% annually. We are advised that fragrances can transport consumers to other realities, remind us of wonderful memories, help us to relax and support overall wellness. Administer whatever "smell test" you like, and the Krigler Boutique is likely to get highest marks. So does Lucy Ladis, a budding journalist who is bound to blossom!...





After six decades of taking care of generations of patients in Galveston, thousands of students at Texas A&M, family, friends, friends of family, kids, grandkids, and anyone else who needed help, William Henry (Bill) Peterek was called home to his Lord and Savior on March 28, 2023. To everyone in Galveston, he was known simply as "Doc."

Bill was born on April 26, 1943, in St. Mary's Hospital in Galveston, Texas, the eldest child of Willie and Stella Novak Peterek. As fate would have it, he would grow up to become a doctor and take care of generations of his Galveston patients in the very same hospital where he was born.

Bill spent his childhood in Shiner and Gonzales, Texas. He worked in his father's grocery store starting at the age of 9 and had fond memories of playing sandlot baseball with his brothers and neighborhood friends, going to area dance halls, and all the simple pleasures of growing up in a small Texas town. He graduated from Gonzales High School in 1961.

After high school, Bill first attended St. Edwards University in Austin and then moved to the University of Texas, where he graduated with honors in 1966. Bill went to medical school at the University of Texas Medical Branch (UTMB) in Galveston, graduating in 1970.

He was preceded in his passing by his parents, Stella and Willie; in-laws Joe Crawford, Mary Crawford Dayton, and Ed Dayton; brothers Allen Peterek and Greg Peterek, brother-in-law Gary Smith; and granddaughter Daisy Ruth Peterek. He is survived by his lifetime dancing partner and wife of 54 years, Terry; and his children and their spouses, Jill and Justin Presnal (College Station), Gabe and Christy Peterek (College Station), and Ben and Heather Peterek (Galveston). He is also survived by his sisters, Janet Smith and

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

Local recipient organizations that may participate must be a non-profit, faith based and governmental organizations that provide food, shelter, and supportive services within the intent of the program; use funds to supplement and extend existing resources and not to substitute or reimburse; practice nondiscrimination; must have a Unique Entity ID (this replaces the Data Universal Number System DUNS number, must have

a Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN), maintain a checking account in the organization's name for EFSP deposits, pay vendors directly within 90 days for services provided, submit required reports electronically, and be willing and capable to carry out the program in conjunction with specific federal regulations.

An application must be submitted for Phase 40. The application consists of a letter on the agency's letterhead explaining the planned services, how many people expected to be served with the funding, Federal Employer Identification(FEIN) and the Unique Entity ID.



Gonzales, where Gonzales Police Department officers tried to spike Turley's vehicle. Turley turned onto Texas 97 by JB Wells Park, Arena & Expo and traveled westbound before turning onto County Road 200 and then driving through a fence near Private Road 2002.

Turley fled the vehicle on foot into a brushy area not far from the Guadalupe River. An unidentified female passenger was located in the vehicle who told deputies Turley was still armed. It appears that she was not a willing participant in the events that occurred.

Texas Department of Public Safety troopers responded to the scene and requested their helicopter to assist with the search. Also assisting was the Nixon Police Department with its K9 unit, which helped to track Turley, as well as Gonzales County constables from Precincts 1, 3 and 4 and the investigator from Gonzales County Attorney's office.

The Gonzales County Emergency Medical Services provided water for the searchers as well as a UTV to aid in the search.

After an hour-long search on foot, Turley was located by Gonzales County deputies and taken into custody without incident and was turned over to the Guadalupe County.

He was charged with aggravated assault against a public servant, evading arrest or detention with a

vehicle, tampering or fabricating physical evidence with intent to impair its use, unauthorized use of a vehicle, unlawful restraint and parole violation.

Turley has a prior arrest in Guadalupe County for theft of property less than \$2,500 (two or more previous convictions); resisting arrest, search or transport; theft of a firearm; failure to identify as a fugitive with intent to give false information and prior parole violations.

Roberts with the University of Virginia and the **Texas Freedom Colonies** Project (TXFC).

It will be held online from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Monday. Interested parties may sign up to join the meeting through https://virginia.zoom.us/ meeting/register/tJYqdO2upj0tGdegTzbp1vlYg-SeG0FaNi54F.

With Dr. Roberts serving as facilitator, Tucy and Gordon will discuss "how co-writing new public histories, transforming public spaces, and powersharing helped diversify local preservation practice and leadership over the past five years in Gonzales County" during the first hour of the meeting.

During the second hour of the meeting, Dr. Roberts will provide an update on the TXFC Project Atlas & Study, talk about expanding the project's work across both state and national borders and even give a brief training.

According to the Texas Freedom Colonies Project, Freedom Colonies are "historically significant communities" that were settled by formerly enslaved people during the Reconstruction and Jim Crow eras in Texas following Emancipation. From 1865-1930, African Americans accumulated land and founded 557 historic black settlements or Freedom Colonies in

Texas. Freedom Colonies were intentional communities created largely in response to political and economic repression by mainstream white society.

So far, six Freedom Colonies have been identified and located by the TXFC in Gonzales County. Those include Mount Eden (aka Hickston), Elm Slough, Terryville, Dement, Harris Chapel and Bascom. Other colonies which still need more information are in Gonzales, Lone Oak and Hood's Point.

Dr. Andrea Roberts is an Associate Professor of Urban and Environmental Planning and Co-Director of the School's Center for Cultural Landscapes at the University of Virginia's (UVA) School of Architecture. Before joining UVA Dr. Roberts was an Associate Professor of Urban Planning at Texas A&M University (TAMU).

In 2014, she founded The Texas Freedom Colonies Project, the vehicle through which she mentors and trains future planners, preservationists, scholars, and communitybased researchers focused on addressing the biggest challenges facing settlements in Texas and around the country invisibility, environmental injustice, land loss, heritage conservation, and endangered historic structures and cemeteries.

activated to the scene. Even through continued negotiations and the deployment of tear gas, Saucedo remained defiant.

Then, at about 4:43 a.m.

Saucedo allegedly pointed a firearm at SWAT team members, who opened fire, killing Saucedo, who was pronounced dead at the scene.

Solis was charged with manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance between four grams and 200 grams, interference with the public duties of an officer and resisting arrest. No charges have been announced against the other individual who was in the vehicle.

The incident remains under investigation by the Seguin Police Department Criminal Investigation Division and, because it was an officer-involved shooting, the Texas Rangers.

Jennifer. McKim had his own adult daughter with him, using her cellphone's locater app to track down his spouse, who was inside Pilat's home with her vehicle parked outside.

Upon finding her car, McKim allegedly retrieved a 9mm handgun from his wife's car, walked up to the front door and pounded on it, demanding entry. His wife allegedly tried to exit the home through a back door and get into her vehicle to leave, but before she could, Pilat came out the front door and an altercation ensued. It started as a shouting match and ended with a single gunshot fired by McKim.

EMS could not airlift Pilat to the hospital due to low-lying fog, instead having to drive him to University Hospital by ambulance.
